- Visitors can explore remarkable nature sites: Punkaharju Ridge and the Linnansaari and Kolovesi National Parks.

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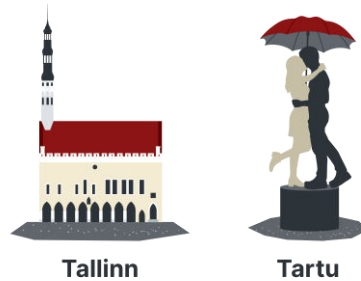

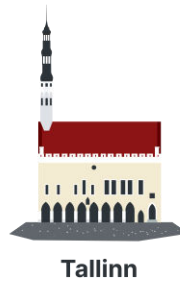
Estonia is a blend of medieval and modern, handmade and high-tech, Baltic and Nordic.

- Easy access from Tallinn to experience the nature - forests, bogs, coastlines and open landscapes.

Getting there: From Latvia by train, bus and car and from Finland by ferry (2 hours) and flight (45 mins).

- In 2024, while Tartu held the title of European Capital of Culture, it caught the attention of several major publications, including National Geographic Traveller, which called it "one of the 30 most exciting destinations to visit in 2024."
- Tartu is internationally recognised as smart city for its green and forward-looking spirit, with a Platinum award from the Green Destinations program, which Tartu has been a part of since 2020.
- Life in Tartu is easy and welcoming. It's a true 15-minute Hanseatic town, that has a special charm – a warm feeling that stays with everyone who visits.

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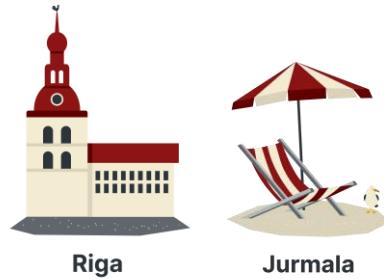
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Latvia

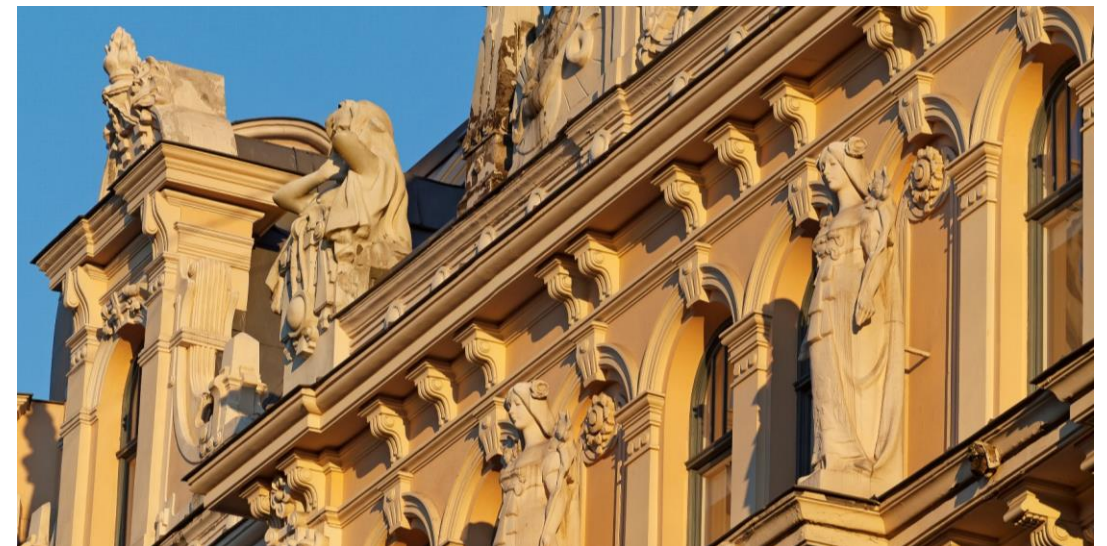

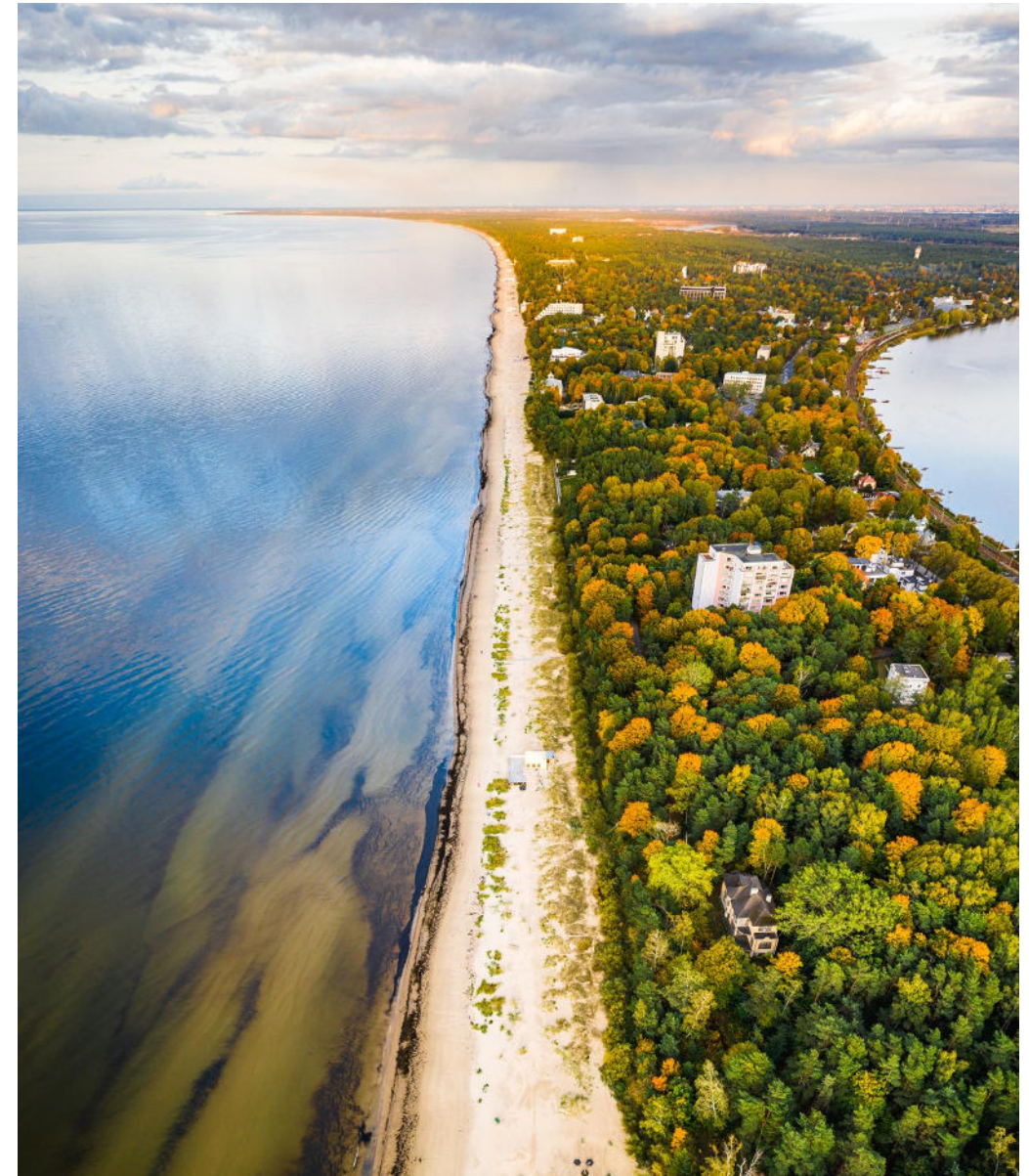
